#### Call to Order

The Reverend Dr. Lane Seitz, District President, called the 74<sup>th</sup> convention of the Minnesota South District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to order in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

#### **Opening Devotion**

President Seitz introduced the convention chaplain, the Reverend Robert Schulze, pastor of St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Worthington, Minnesota.

Chaplain Schulze led the delegates in reading Psalm 98:1-6 responsively and in singing "Crown Him with Many Crowns." He began his devotion by recounting a number of examples of difficult things to catch. He used this to illustrate the reality that it is hard to catch the attention of some people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is what makes evangelism so challenging to us – some people just don't want to be caught. This underscores the theological reality that the old sinful nature wants nothing to do with God. But we who believe in Jesus Christ are grateful that God caught us. In our spiritual game of hide and seek, God is it; He is the one seeking us. His is the gentle

hand that finds us in our brokenness, and He comes to embrace us with His love in Christ. God catches us, then sets us free. He sets us free to go and learn and tell and pray and send and give and celebrate. As St. Peter writes: [we have been] "chosen to declare the praises of Him who called us out of darkness into His wonderful light."

Chaplain Schulze concluded his devotion with a prayer and in leading the delegates in singing, "Jesus Shall Reign."

President Seitz led the assembly in expressing its appreciation to Rev. William Otte, along with the members and choir of Trinity Lutheran Church, Rochester, for hosting the opening worship service. He also introduced Mr. Paul Soulek, son of Pastor Marvin and Lynn Soulek and a student at Concordia University, Seward, Nebraska, who served as the organist for the convention.

#### Registration and Credentials Committee

The Reverend Thomas Evans, chair of the Registration and Credentials Committee, was invited forward. He reported that as of 8:00 a.m. the number of voting delegates was as follows:

Pastors	163 out of a possible 198
Lay	191 out of a possible 221
Total	354 out of a possible 419

He announced that a quorum was present, and on behalf of the committee he moved the adoption of the report. The motion was carried.

#### Reading of the Convention Rules

President Seitz introduced Mrs. Darleen Harens, convention parliamentarian, who read the proposed convention rules (*Convention Workbook*, A-11 to A-12.)

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the convention rules as read.

# Adoption of the Agenda

President Seitz placed before the assembly the revised agenda for the convention (*CW*, A-19a through A-22a).

It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the revised convention agenda.

President Seitz introduced the convention manager, Ms. Lu Clemmensen, and her assistant, Ms. Julie Bigner.

#### Devotional Bible Study - Part I

President Seitz introduced the Rev. Dr. Robert Holst, President of Concordia University, St. Paul, who served as the convention Bible study leader. His three-part study was based on the convention theme "It's Time to Fish – Catch, Equip and Release." His first session, "A Time to Catch," was based on Luke 5:1-11.

#### **Constitution and Membership Committee**

President Seitz introduced the Reverend Evan Schiller, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President of the District and Chair of the Constitution and Membership Committee.

Rev. Schiller explained the work of the committee and recognized the following committee members: Mr. Daniel Utter, Mr. Harold Kenow, Mrs. Harriet Rudd, and Dr. Philip Tesch. He reported that during the past triennium the committee reviewed forty-eight documents, of which the committee recommended forty for approval by the District Board of Directors. The committee also returned twenty-eight documents to congregations with recommended changes, of which twenty were resubmitted and approved. Among the reasons most often cited for non-approval were (1) improper disposal of property at the time of dissolution, (2) inadequate meeting announcement provisions, (3) failure to specify the calling of synodically approved workers, and (d) inconsistency between the constitution and bylaws.

# Recognition of New Members and Congregations

President Seitz invited the new ordained pastors and commissioned ministers to come before the convention for recognition. (The new individual members are listed in the *Convention Workbook*, F-1 through F-4, and F-12 through F-17. They are identified as candidates.)

President Seitz also announced that two new congregations were also received as members in the past triennium: Family of Christ Lutheran Church, Rochester, and Grace International Lutheran Church, Robbinsdale. He invited the pastors and lay delegates from these congregations to come forward.

President Seitz then introduced The Reverend Dr. Gerald Kieschnick, President of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, who addressed the new members and offered a word of welcome.

#### Video Presentation

President Seitz introduced a short video presentation from the LCMS Commission on Ministerial Growth and Support, which will present two awards later in the convention.

#### President's Address

President Seitz proceeded with his formal address to the convention. He announced that the theme of this convention is based on Luke 5:1-11. Even though the disciples had fished all night and caught nothing, they did as the Lord commanded; and their nets were filled to the point of breaking. Jesus tells the disciples not to be afraid. They would no longer catch fish, and instead catch men.

President Seitz reminded the delegates that our task is a missionary task – to catch, equip and release men, women and children for service to Christ and others. He stated that Minnesota is a land of opportunity, and he lay before the convention the many fishing opportunities God is providing. He noted that along with opportunity comes a challenge. Our mission goals will require an additional \$200,000. We must resist the impulse to pull back and cut funding.

President Seitz lay before the assembly the opportunities and challenges facing our work as fishers of men. Every congregation and school is a mission outpost. The District's work is to provide leadership and support. There are a number of new starts underway in addition to other potential sites for new starts. He urged the congregations and workers of the District to stay the course, stay focused on the agenda Christ set for us, and pray that more people catch the vision to seek and to save the lost.

part was devoted to answering written questions submitted by the delegates and read by Ms. Lu Clemmensen. **Resolutions A-B-C-D** President Seitz directed the delegates to Omnibus Resolutions A-B-C-D (Convention Workbook, G-49 through G-53). Resolution A was placed before the convention. A motion to remove Memorial A-12 was adopted (Y:165 / N:163). The result of the amendment was that there were no items left in the resolution, so the convention needed to take no further action on Resolution A. **Resolution B** was placed before the convention. It was adopted as printed (Y:260 / N:83). Resolution C was placed before the convention. A motion to remove Memorial A-4 was defeated (Y:173 / N:193). A motion to remove Memorial B-3 was defeated (Y:150 / N:216). Resolution C was adopted as printed (Y:233 / N:128). President Seitz explained that there were no items included in Resolution D, so no action was needed by the convention. Circuit Realignment Committee Presentation President Seitz introduced the Reverend Dr. James Pragman, chair of the Circuit Realignment Committee, and Mr. Kurt Fuhr, District Vice President for the Lutheran Church Extension Fund. Dr. Pragman explained the work of the committee in soliciting input from various 

Dr. Pragman explained the work of the committee in soliciting input from various groups within the District. He recognized and thanked the members of the committee: Rev. Dennis Ahl, Ms. Lu Clemmensen, Rev. Jack Dahl, Mr. Jack Keers, and Rev. Evan Schiller.

Mr. Fuhr walked the delegates through the committee proposal (*Convention Workbook*, C-10 through C-88).

# Circuit Realignment Committee (#2)

President Seitz introduced the Reverend Jeff Lee, Committee Chair.

Resolution 2-01A, "To Implement Minnesota South District Circuit Realignment for 2009 District Convention and for the 2010 Convention of the Synod" was placed before the convention. This revised resolution consists of page G-40 in the *Convention Workbook* and revised page G-41, which was distributed to the delegates.

A motion was made to amend Resolution 2-01A as follows:

1. strike from the first resolved (lines 17-19) the words "according to the realignment proposal printed in the 2006 Convention Workbook on pages C-18 through C-81 and on pages C-84 through C-87."

2. strike from the second resolved (lines 22-25) the words "according to the realignment proposal printed in the 2006 Convention Workbook on pages C-18 through C-81 and on pages C-84 through C-87."

3. add "WHEREAS, it would seem reasonable that conferences and regions also be roughly equivalent in both the number of congregations and the number of communicants within congregations;"

4. add "WHEREAS, in the plan prepared by the District's Circuit Realignment Committee, the relative size of the conferences and regions are as disproportionate as at current, if not more so – one being virtually twice as large as another in the number of congregations and also larger in the number of communicants at the same time – which results in the members of Region IV (which is geographically almost half the District) being significantly disenfranchised in representation on the District Board of Directors;"

5. add "RESOLVED, that circuits within the Minnesota South District LCMS be reorganized according to the plan developed by the District's Circuit Realignment Committee;"

6. add "RESOLVED, that these circuits be grouped together into conferences and regions according to the following plan instead of the plan proposed by the District's Circuit Realignment Committee;"

The mover explained that the plan indicated in final resolve is the following plan:

He explained that the "It's Time to Fish Mission Initiative," of which every dollar goes directly to missions, is to help meet these challenges. He urged the delegates to support this mission initiative both financially and in prayer.

The floor committee was dismissed until the next time it was scheduled to appear before the convention.

#### **Doctrine and Administration Committee (#1)**

Resolution 1-01 "To Amend Articles of Incorporation to Conform to Resolution 4-11 of the 2004 Convention of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod" (CW, G-1 and G-2) was placed before the convention. The resolution was adopted (Y:313 / N:42) as presented.

Resolution 1-02 "To Approve Amendments to the District Handbook" (CW, G-3 through G-21) was placed before the convention. The resolution was adopted (Y:345 / N:16) as presented.

**Resolution 1-03 "To Rearrange the District Handbook"** (*CW*, G-22 through G-25) was placed before the convention. The resolution was adopted Y:354 / N:7) as presented.

Resolution 1-04A "To Form One Electoral Circuit Consisting of the Current Minneapolis and Hennepin South Circuits for the 2007 Convention of the Synod" (previously distributed) was placed before the convention. A motion to consider Memorial A-23 as a substitute was ruled out of order, since the committee will be bringing forward a resolution responding to the memorial. A question was raised concerning a possible inconsistency between Resolution 1-04A and Resolution 1-16 (which addresses Memorial A-23). President Seitz referred the resolution back to the committee.

(Note: Resolution 1-04A did not return to the convention floor. The issue was dealt with by Resolution 1-16A.)

Resolution 1-05 "To Address Circuit Exceptions" (CW, G-27) was placed before the convention. President Seitz referred this resolution back to the committee since in lines 15-17 it referred to an action the convention had not yet taken concerning the circuit realignment proposal.

Resolution 1-06 "To Encourage Consideration of CCM-Related Overtures by Convention of Synod" (CW, G-28) was placed before the convention. A motion to amend by striking the word "encourage" in line 19 and replacing it with the word "require" was defeated (Y:174 / N:188). The resolution was defeated (Y:119 / N:242).

#### Devotional Bible Study - Part II

President Seitz again welcomed to the podium the Rev. Dr. Robert Holst to continue his devotional Bible study. He based the theme of his study "A Time to Equip" on the Book of Jonah. He used Jonah's story to illustrate how God indeed equips us to reach out to people. He ended with a prayer that God would equip His people to go to the Ninevahs of our time to fish in a frightful, wicked world and to share with that world the divine message of God's compassion, mercy and resurrection to life everlasting.

President Seitz again welcomed to the podium the Rev. Dr. Robert Holst to continue his devotional Bible study. He based the theme of his study "A Time to Release" on John 21. He used the story of Jesus and Peter as an illustration of our Lord releasing a disciple for ministry and witness.

President Seitz led the convention in thanking Dr. Holst for his Bible study.

# Report of the President of the Synod - Part 2

President Seitz invited forward the Reverend Dr. Dean Nadasdy, senior pastor of Woodbury Lutheran Church, Woodbury, and 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President of the Synod. Dr. Nadasdy introduced President Kieschnick's report on the state of the Synod.

# Video Presentation

President Seitz introduced the next video greeting, which was from Ms. Sherylea Downes, the development director for the District, and Mr. Glenn Thiel, gift-planning counselor for the District.

William Otte, committee chair, noted that in the event the numbers don't support the information we have at this time then this resolution empowers the Board of Directors to develop an acceptable remedy.

The amended resolution was adopted (Y:325 / N:8).

A motion was made to substitute Memorial A-14 (CW, D43 and D-44). The Chair put the motion before the convention. A point of order was raised that the mover of the substitute motion has time to explain his reasons. The Chair explained that it was the mover's choice. The mover elected to use his time. The motion to substitute Memorial A-14 was adopted (Y:170 / N:156).

Memorial A-14 was now under consideration. After some discussion a motion to call the question was adopted (Y:287 / N:39). The vote on Memorial A-14 was a tie (Y:163 / N:163); thus the Memorial was defeated.

Resolution 1-10 is again before the convention. A motion to postpone to the 2009 District Convention consideration of Resolution 1-10 was adopted (Y:248 / N:74).

Resolution 1-11 "To Memorialize Synod to Overrule CCM Opinions 02-2296 and 02-2309" (CW, G-34 and G-35) was placed before the convention. The resolution was adopted (Y:213 / N:111) as printed.

The Chair dismissed the committee and led the convention in offering its thanks.

#### **Unfinished Business**

President Seitz invited the delegates to look at the slate of candidates for Circuit Counselor (CW, E-72). He announced the additions to the slate from the circuit caucuses. The slate is as follows

# RESOLUTION 1-08A [Memorial A-10, CW, pp. D-36 to D-37 and Resolution 1-08A, CW, p. G-31A]

## RE: TO MEMORIALIZE SYNOD TO SPECIFY SYNODICAL PRESIDENT'S DUTY TO "CALL UP FOR REVIEW"

WHEREAS, On August 20, 2002 the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters (CCM) issued its opinion 02-2282, "President's Duty to Call up for Review." It opined, with respect to the synodical bylaw then numbered 2.27 and the Synod's Dispute Resolution process (then contained in chapter VIII of the synodical Bylaws), that "a President of the Synod has responsibility to act" in the event that he were to "become aware, before announcement of a decision of the Dispute Resolution Panel – that an investigating officer has misstated a doctrinal position of the church or acted in violation of the Constitution, Bylaws, or resolutions of the Synod"; and

WHEREAS, The Commission cited Article XI B 1-4 of the Synod's Constitution, adding: "The President's right and/or responsibility to call up for review and action of an investigation [sic] officer carrying out the responsibilities of Bylaw 2.27 c flows from his constitutional responsibilities and powers." The Synod should consider this opinion of the Commission on Constitutional Matters and the idea it expresses; and

WHEREAS, The Commission's interpretation is a new idea. Supposedly, it is grounded in the synodical constitution, Article XI B 1-4. Yet past Presidents of the Synod serving under the same constitutional provisions have not cited them as rationale, for example, to call up for review decisions of District Presidents resulting in members of the Synod being suspended. Past Presidents of the Synod and others realized that this sort of action would not be appropriate; and

WHEREAS, Any knowledge of such a case that a President might gain at a premature point could turn out to be incomplete and even misleading. Therefore the Synod has specified the time for its President to carry out his duties with respect to matters in dispute resolution: after decisions are finalized. If a question of doctrine or practice is involved, Bylaw 1.10.8. (not unlike the former Bylaw 8.09 d) provides that the synodical President may appeal the decision. The same Bylaw also authorizes the President to request an opinion of the Commission on Theology and Church Relations (if he fears that theology went awry as the case was handled) or an opinion of the Commission on Constitutional Matters (if he thinks that the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod were misread); and

WHEREAS, The language "call up for review" is not found in the synodical Constitution, which the CCM cites. Rather it comes from Bylaw 3.3.1.2(c), which is former Bylaw 3.101 B 5, adopted by the Synod in 1998 upon recommendation from the

"Blue Ribbon" Committee on Structure. For clarity's sake, that committee has restated this entire Bylaw, dividing the President's powers and duties into three clusters: those that are ecclesiastical in nature, those that are administrative in nature, and those that are both ecclesiastical and administrative; and

WHEREAS, Bylaw 3.3.1.2(c), which provides that the President shall "call up for review any action by an individual officer, executive or agency which, in his view, may be in violation of the Constitution, Bylaws, and resolutions of the Synod," falls under his "administrative" duties. Thus, in 1998 the Synod did not apply the President's "call up for review" power to ecclesiastical matters such as decisions in pending dispute resolution cases. For the Commission on Constitutional Matters to apply this language to these very matters is to overlook distinctions the Synod itself has made. Confusion results where the Synod had striven for clarity; and

WHEREAS, Before the "Blue Ribbon" Committee's restated Bylaw on presidential powers and duties was adopted by the Synod in 1998, the Commission on Constitutional Matters approved its constitutionality. But only four years later, in its August 20, 2002 opinion the Commission set forth a new reading of the synodical Constitution under which this Bylaw could not have been approved for adoption. For the Bylaw to fall into line with the Commission's changed reading of the Constitution, its "calling up for review" point would at minimum have to be reclassified as both ecclesiastical and administrative; and

WHEREAS; The Constitution has not changed in this respect since 1998, nor has the Bylaw in question (although the Bylaw was re-numbered in 2004), yet the Commission has changed its opinion. This changed opinion stands in need of correction by the Synod; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the 2006 Minnesota South District convention memorializes the LCMS in convention; To reaffirm its intention, expressed in current Bylaw 3.3.1.2(c), to situate the synodical President's authority to "call up for review" within the administrative sphere of his powers and duties, not in the ecclesiastical sphere, and therefore the President's constitutional powers do not include calling up for review the decisions of investigating officers before the decisions of the appropriate Dispute Resolution Panels have been announced; and be it finally

*RESOLVED,* That the 2006 Minnesota South District Convention memorialize the Synod in Convention to overrule opinion 02-2282 of the Commission on Constitutional Matters.

WHEREAS, In 2004 Res. 8-01A the Synod adopted new procedures for ecclesiastical supervision and dispute resolution. It was acting on recommendations of a presidential task force that had been made widely available only a few weeks before the synodical convention via the 2004 Convention Workbook (pages 25-43); and

WHEREAS, Adopting such a large and complex set of bylaw changes on short notice rarely, if ever, yields good results. The bylaws approved under 2004 Res. 8-01A have shown themselves to have a number of very serious flaws; and

WHEREAS, These bylaws require that a face-to-face meeting must precede any and all public rebuke of a public sin such as teaching false doctrine (which would be a cause for expelling a member from the Synod); and

WHEREAS, Citing Matthew 18:15, the new Bylaw 2.14.3(c) asserts that the faceo-face meeting is a biblical requirement which must be carried out also in "public" cases - despite biblical counterexamples such as Gal. 2:11 ff. and the affirmation of the Lutheran Confessions that "where the sin is so public that the judge and the whole world are aware of it, you can without sin . . . testify publicly" concerning the offender Large Catechism I 284); and

WHEREAS, Under 2004 Res. 8-01A our Synod adopted bylaws which fly in the face of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions; and

WHEREAS, The new bylaws adopted under 2004 Res. 8-01A are unwise as well as theologically unsound; and

WHEREAS, They establish panels to hear cases in which members of the Synod might be expelled from synodical membership. These panels are composed entirely of district presidents. Thus a basic element of wise jurisprudence - trial by a group of one's peers - has been all but removed from our Synod's process for handling expulsion cases. Only if a district president were in jeopardy of removal would the case be heard by a group of his peers; and

WHEREAS, There is at least one other theological problem with the bylaws adopted under 2004 Res. 8-01A. Hearing panels are composed entirely of district presidents. They have no other members, clergy or lay. These panels hear all cases in

which members of the Synod might be expelled, including those involving false doctrine; and

WHEREAS, With the adoption of 2004 Res. 8-01A, and for the first time in the history of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, there can be no lay participation in deciding cases of false doctrine at the synodical level; and

WHEREAS, At its previous convention in 2001 the Synod reaffirmed its first doctrinal statement, C.F.W. Walther's <u>Church and Ministry</u>, which says: "To the ministry of the Word, according to divine right, belongs also the duty to judge doctrine, but laymen also possess this right. Therefore, in the ecclesiastical courts and councils they are accorded both a seat and vote together with the clergy" (thesis 10 on the Ministry). Thus, 2004 Res. 8-01A contradicts the Synod's oldest and most recently reaffirmed doctrinal statement; therefore be it

In Christian love for the congregations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, the Board of Directors of the Minnesota South District of the LCMS expresses concern regarding opinions 02-2296 and 02-2309 of the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters (CCM).

WHEREAS, The CCM has opined that the "Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod do not allow or contemplate the expulsion of a member of the Synod on the basis of an action taken with the full knowledge and approval of the appropriate ecclesiastical supervisor" (02-2296; see also opinion 02-2309); and

WHEREAS, Scripture repeatedly warns against partiality in judgment (Deut. 1:17; Eph. 6:9; Col. 3:25; James 2:1, 9) and against "making the word of God of none effect through [human] tradition" (Mk. 7:13), "teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Mk. 7:7), and Scripture teaches, "we must obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29); and

WHEREAS, The CCM's stance is also incompatible with the Lutheran Confessions, which teach that "it is not lawful for a human being to repeal an obligation that is plainly a matter of divine right" (Augsburg Confession XXVII, 24, Kolb-Wengert, p. 85) while denying that biblical texts such as Luke 10:16 and Heb. 13:17 grant ecclesiastical supervisors any authority beyond the Gospel itself (Apology XXVIII, 17-21, pp. 291-292); and

WHEREAS, The CCM in effect changes the synodical constitution by granting immunity from expulsion to those who do not comply with the conditions of membership so long as they have secured the permission of their ecclesiastical supervisors; and

WHEREAS, a confessionally-based Synod cannot endure for long if its members are no longer held responsible for the words and actions by which they confess the faith; and

WHEREAS, District and Synod presidents can and may grant their approval to those under their supervision by way of confidential communications, making it difficult if not impossible for those who elect them to know about the immunities they have granted; and

WHEREAS, extenuating circumstances can be taken into account wherein a member of the Synod has sought the advice of the appropriate ecclesiastical supervisor in a difficult case; therefore be it

*RESOLVED*, That the MNS District in convention memorializes the 2007 Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to overrule CCM opinions 02-2296 and 02-2309.

The Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters in its Opinion 05-2447 (dated October 16-18, 2005) has stated that "the establishment of electoral circuits depends upon existing visitation circuits" and furthermore that "visitation circuits are the building blocks by which electoral circuits are constituted (paragraph (a) of Bylaw 3.1.2)" [sic]. An **electoral circuit** "shall represent from 7 to 20 congregations, involving an aggregate communicant membership ranging from 1,500 to 10,000." The standards to be met both by visitation and electoral circuits are identical; the realignment of visitation circuits is also the realignment of electoral circuits.

After studying the demographic data and in light of the standards set by the Synod itself for visitation and electoral circuits, the Circuit Realignment Committee proposes the realignment of circuits in the Minnesota South District and implementation of the realignment, as set forth in this resolution.

WHEREAS, The realignment of both visitation and electoral circuits in the Minnesota South District is being proposed to the District's 2006 Convention; and
