## 1 Friday, June 15, 2012 2 3 Session 2 4 5 Call to Order 6 The seventy-sixth convention of the Minnesota South District of The Lutheran 7 8 Church—Missouri Synod was called to order at 8:03 a.m. by the President, Rev. Dr. 9 Lane Seitz, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. 10 11 **Opening Devotional Bible Study** 12 13 President Seitz introduced Rev. Dennis Heiden, Senior Pastor of Hosanna Lutheran 14 Church in Mankato, who served as convention chaplain. He led the convention in 15 singing "Holy, Holy, Holy." 16 17 The theme of the opening devotion was "Free and Fanatically Focused!" It was 18 based on 1 Corinthians 9:19-23, the convention theme verse, and Philippians 3:7-14. 19 He encouraged those attending the convention to do some "around the table" Bible 20 study to discover reasons why Paul stayed free, focused, and on fire. This happened 21 because Paul had a vivid memory of the mercy that had found him on the way to 22 Damascus; Paul's life purpose was very simple, to testify to the gospel of God's 23 grace; because Paul did not have a detailed "plan" - it was simply to follow the 24 divine GPS plan of the Holy Spirit; Paul leveraged the strength of his weaknesses, 25 knowing that God's strength is made perfect in weakness; because of Paul's self-26 forgetfulness; because of his heart for the sinner to meet the Savior. 27 28 Rev. Heiden closed the devotional Bible study with prayer. 29 30 **Registration and Credentials Committee** 31 32 Dr. Seitz called on Rev. Tom Evans, chairman of the Registration and Credentials 33 Committee, to give an initial report. Registrations at this time included advisory 34 delegates - 81; lay delegates - 209; pastoral delegates - 179, for a total of 388 voting 35 delegates. One third of the total possible voting delegates is required for a quorum. 36 Rev. Evans announced that the requirements for a quorum have been met. 37 38 A motion was made and seconded to accept the report of the Registration and 39 Credentials Committee. The motion was carried by voice vote.

## Reading of the Convention Rules President Seitz introduced Mrs. Darleen Harens, convention parliamentarian, who read the proposed convention rules (*Convention Workbook pp.* 11-12) A motion was made and seconded to adopt the convention rules as read. The motion was carried by voice vote. Adoption of the Convention Agenda President Seitz placed the revised convention agenda as distributed at the time of registration before the assembly. It was labeled pp. 19-22. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the revised convention agenda. The motion was carried by voice vote. Report of the Constitution and Membership Committee President Seitz introduced Rev. Evan Schiller, chairman of the Constitution and Membership Committee. The report is summarized as follows: • Other members of the committee during the triennium were Mr. Daniel Utter, Mr. Harold Kenow, and Mr. Cletus Pfeiffer. The committee reviewed fifty-five (55) documents and recommended thirty-two (32) of them for approval by the Board of Directors. A list of those approved is in the CW on p. 52. Six documents are currently being reviewed by the committee. (Note: The complete text of the report is included in the protocol copy of these minutes.) The committee was dismissed with the thanks of the convention. Recognition of New Members and Congregations President Seitz introduced the ordained and commissioned ministers of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod who have been added to the roster of the Minnesota South District since the last convention. President Seitz introduced the First Vice-president of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, Rev. Dr. Herbert Mueller, and invited him to bring a word of personal greeting to these new members of the Minnesota South District and The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

# President's Address

President Seitz delivered his formal address to the convention.

Under the convention theme of "Free and Focused," Dr. Seitz suggested an analogy that captures the challenges and opportunities before the convention. He suggested that this convention is like a fork in a road, a choice between "Bondage" and "Freedom." He suggested that there are many within the boundaries of the Minnesota South District who are in bondage to things like:

- alcohol and drugs
- homelessness
- spiritual bondage (those who do not know the grace of God)
- religious bondage, brought by a wave of immigrants to Minnesota
- Satan worship and the influence of Satan in the world
- the evils of the Internet
- materialism
- those in bondage to guilt and shame over previous sins

Often we do not even see those around us who are in such bondage.

The other fork in the road leads to the path of Freedom, freedom from sin, guilt, and shame, which comes only through Christ. We are free people who live under the grace of God. Living free in Christ allows us to close the book on the past and move on to a new, free, and focused life. Our challenge is to stand firm and not let ourselves get sucked back into living in bondage. In 1 Corinthians 9:19, there are two crucial ideas:

1. Those who are free in Christ are to focus on those who are not free, on those who are on the road called Bondage.

2. Those who are free are called to be flexible, open to using every legitimate means to reach those who are not yet traveling the road called Freedom. We

1 must do so without compromising our doctrine or the truth of the Holy 2 Scriptures. 3 4 Finally, he encouraged the convention to: 5 6 Stay on the road called Freedom. 7 Focus on those who are still in Bondage. 8 Use every legitimate means to reach them for Jesus Christ! 9 10 Ms. Lu Clemmensen introduced Mrs. Donna Seitz, wife of President Seitz, and 11 presented her with a bouquet of flowers in appreciation of her service and support 12 for President Seitz during the 21 years of his service as President of the Minnesota 13 South District. 14 15 16 Nominations Committee - Floor Committee Nominations 17 18 President Seitz called on Mr. Andy Frerich, chairman of the nominating committee, 19 to present the slate of nominees as prepared by the 2012 Convention Nominating 20 Committee. # Report of the LCMS President, Part I

President Seitz called Rev. Dr. Herbert Mueller, First Vice President of the LCMS, to the podium to give Part I of the Synodical President's report. Rev. Dr. Mueller represented Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison, President of the LCMS, who would join the convention later in the day.

Rev. Dr. Mueller led the assembly in a Bible study based on the Synodical theme of "Witness, Mercy, Life Together." Beginning with a look at Galatians 2:9-10, Dr. Mueller pointed out that all three elements of the Synodical theme are present in this one verse. Witness - going to the Gentiles, going to the circumcised; Mercy - only remember the poor; Life Together - the "right hand of fellowship" (koinonia).

For our Synod, witness involves testifying of Christ and all that He has done. Mercy involves serving in Christ's name. Life together is an expression of the fellowship (*koinonia*) we have in Christ Jesus, which is the result of God's action, not ours.

Members of congregations want pastors who will bear witness to and confess Christ to the community; one who preaches well; one who is compassionate, who cares, who has mercy on hurting people; one who knows how to live with his congregation and circuit brothers.

Members want congregations that faithfully confess the faith and bear witness for Christ; who care for one another and have mercy for the world of hurting people; a place where we are connected to one another in Christ.

All other matters regarding membership shall be as provided in the Constitution *and Bylaws* of THE LUTHERAN CHURCH—MISSOURI SYNOD

#### ARTICLE IV

#### Amendments

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended as provided by law, under which this body is incorporated, provided that the proposed amendments have a) been submitted to the Commission on Constitutional Matters of the LCMS for review and approval prior to referral to the members of the corporation; and b) been acted upon favorably at a regular meeting of the members of the corporation or a special meeting thereof, called for that purpose, by two-thirds majority of the delegates voting on said amendment, certified by the presiding officer, verified by the secretary of the corporation and recorded with the secretary of the State of Minnesota, according to law.

#### **CURRENT BYLAWS**

# 1.12 Precedence of the Bylaws of the Synod No bylaw provision of the Minnesota South District can be interpreted to conflict with the bylaws of THE LUTHERAN CHURCH—MISSOURI SYNOD. If a bylaw of the District conflicts with current bylaws of the Synod, the bylaws of the Synod govern.

## 2.20.8 Reviewing Continued Eligibility of Members

- a) If information with respect to an individual member of the District is made known to or becomes known by the District President and if after reasonable investigation he believes that there may be a basis, given the nature of the circumstances, for suspending the eligibility status of the person, the President of the District may suspend that person's eligibility status until the matter is satisfactorily resolved or the applicable dispute resolution process, as set forth in the Handbook of the Synod, can be completed.
- b) During the period that the suspension is in effect, the member shall have "Suspended Status" as provided in the Handbook of the Synod and shall be ineligible for service in the District. All records of the District shall reflect this fact. In addition, the District President shall notify the President of the Synod and all other District Presidents in writing of the suspension of the affected person's eligibility status.

## 3.1.2.6 Nonvoting Advisory Delegates to the Convention of the Synod

During an official conference or a caucus (convened by the District Secretary) at the convention, advisory delegates shall elect their delegates to the national convention of the Synod in accordance with the Handbook of the Synod, "Each district shall select one advisory delegate for every 60 advisory ordained ministers and one advisory delegate for every 60 commissioned ministers on the roster of the Synod.

#### PROPOSED BYLAWS

## 1.12 Precedence of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod

No bylaw provision of the Minnesota South District (herein the "District") can be interpreted to conflict with the Constitution and bylaws of THE LUTHERAN CHURCH—MISSOURI SYNOD (herein, the "Synod"). If a bylaw of the District conflicts with current Constitution and bylaws of the Synod, the Constitution and bylaws of the Synod govern.

## 2.20.8 Reviewing Continued Eligibility of Members

An individual member of the Synod may be placed on restricted status by the District President, following the procedures and provisions set forth in the Bylaws of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (Bylaw 2.13.2-2.13.4) as subject to applicable laws.

## 3.1.2.6 Nonvoting Advisory Delegates to the Convention of the Synod

During an official conference or a caucus (convened by the District Secretary) at the convention, advisory delegates shall elect their delegates to the national convention of the Synod in accordance with the Handbook of the Synod, "Each district shall select one advisory delegate for every 60 advisory ordained ministers <u>and specific ministry pastors</u>, and one advisory delegate for every 60 commissioned ministers on the roster of the Synod.

Fractional groupings shall be disregarded except that each district shall be entitled to at least one advisory delegate in each category."

The names of delegates so elected shall be announced at the District Convention. The District Secretary shall forward the list to the Secretary of Synod. The District Treasury shall pay the convention expenses of these advisory delegates.

#### 4.2.12.1 Committee on Registration, Credentials and Attendance

The Committee on Registration, Credentials, and Attendance shall make all necessary arrangements for proper registration of the convention delegates, and examine their credentials. At the beginning of the first business session it shall report to the President whether or not a quorum is in attendance. Full-time and part-time absences shall be reported to this committee. A full report of this committee shall be filed with the Secretary.

#### 4.2.13 Agenda

- a) The agenda for the District Convention shall be prepared and arranged by the Praesidium in consultation with the Board of Directors.
- b) All District matters which warrant more thorough study before action by the convention is taken shall, without debate, be referred by the President, or Chairman, to a floor committee for consideration and recommendation.

#### 4.2.13.3 Membership and Representation

- a) In the first business session of the Convention, the Committee on Constitutions and Membership shall submit its report so that the delegates and congregations admitted may be seated.
- b) A parish that consists of two or more congregations shall be entitled to one lay vote.
- c) A parish temporarily vacant shall be entitled to one lay vote.

Fractional groupings shall be disregarded except that each district shall be entitled to at least one advisory delegate in each category."

The names of delegates so elected shall be announced at the District Convention. The District Secretary shall forward the list to the Secretary of Synod. The District Treasury shall pay the convention expenses of these advisory delegates.

The Committee on Registration, Credentials, and Attendance shall make all necessary arrangements for proper registration of the convention delegates, and examine their credentials. A full report of this committee shall be filed with the <u>District</u> Secretary.

#### 4.2.13 Agenda

- a) The agenda for the District Convention shall be prepared and arranged by the Praesidium in consultation with the Board of Directors.
- b) All District matters which warrant more thorough study before action by the convention is taken shall, without debate, be referred by the President, or Chairman, to a floor committee for consideration and recommendation.

#### 4.2.13.3 Membership and Representation

- a) In the first business session of the Convention, the Committee on Constitutions and Membership shall submit its report so that the delegates and congregations admitted may be seated.
- b) A *multiple-congregation* parish that consists of two or more congregations shall be entitled to one lay vote.
- c) A parish temporarily vacant <u>in the</u> <u>Pastoral Office</u> shall be entitled to one lay vote.

h) A member (and an alternate) of the Committee of the Synod for the Convention Nominations

#### 4.2.15.2 Nominations for President and Vicepresidents

Nominations for the office of President and Vicepresidents of the District shall be made in the following manner:

> Each voting congregation shall be entitled to nominate one clergyman from the clergy roster of the District as a candidate for President and one clergyman from its region as a Vicepresident.

The convention may nominate from the floor additional candidates for the offices of President and Vicepresidents.

#### 4.2.15.3 Ranking of Vice-presidents

Separate ballots shall be cast to rank each of the Vice-presidents.

The committee shall publish a h) complete and full list with pertinent information of each person suggested to the committee for consideration. The published information shall include the full name, address, and name and location of the congregation where the person is a member. This list shall be distributed along with the completed list of those nominated by the committee and published by the Secretary of the District in the preconvention issue of the official District publication and also in the official convention book of reports and overtures (Convention Manual).

## 4.2.15.1 Officers and Committees to be Elected

h) A member (and an alternate) of the Committee of the Synod for the Convention Nominations <u>when</u> required by the Synod.

#### 4.2.15.2 Nominations for President and Vicepresidents

Nominations for the office of President and Vicepresidents of the District shall be made in the following manner:

a) Each voting congregation shall be entitled to nominate one clergyman from the clergy roster of the *Synod* as a candidate for President and one clergyman from its region as a Vice-president. If elected, nominees shall be members of member congregations of the district upon assuming office and during the course of their tenure.

The convention may nominate from the floor additional candidates for the offices of President and Vicepresidents.

#### 4.2.15.3 Ranking of Vice-presidents

After the Vice-presidents have been selected from each region, a ballot shall be cast by the district convention to rank the vice-presidents, which action shall also constitute election.

The published information shall include the full name, address, and name and location of the congregation where the person is a member. #### 4.4.10 Minnesota South District President

He may call upon Circuit Vice-presidents and Counselors to assist him.

#### 4.4.10 Minnesota South District President

- a) The District President, in accordance with the Constitution and Bylaws of Synod, shall supervise the doctrine, the life, and the official administration on the part of the ordained and commissioned ministers District, and shall inquire into the prevailing religious conditions of the congregations of the District. Therefore, as often as possible, he shall attend the conferences of ordained and commissioned ministers held in the District, advise the congregations of the District as to the calling of ordained and commissioned ministers, give counsel when requested, and reply to inquiries. He may call upon the Vice-presidents and Circuit Counselors to assist him.
- b) He shall see to it that the purposes of the *Synod and* District are promoted and the resolutions of *the Synod and* District are carried out.

#### 7.2 Minnesota South District Bylaws

Changes in, and additions to, the Bylaws of the Minnesota South District may be made, provided they: (1) are not contrary to the Articles of Incorporation of the District; (2) are presented in writing to the District; (3) are separately considered and acted upon by the Standing District Handbook Committee; (4) are approved by the Commission on Constitutional Matters of the Synod and (5) are passed by a majority vote of the Convention.

#### 4.11.3 Full Time Positions of the District

The District may create or abolish *other* full-time salaried officers *positions*. The number of such full-time offices *positions* shall be determined by the District according to prevailing needs.

#### 7.2 Minnesota South District Bylaws

Changes in, and additions to, the Bylaws of the Minnesota South District may be made, provided they: (1) are not contrary to the Articles of Incorporation of the District; (2) are presented in writing to the District; (3) are separately considered and acted upon by the Standing District Handbook Committee; (4) are approved by the Commission on Constitutional Matters of the Synod in advance of the convention and (5) are passed by a majority vote of the Convention, and (6) amendments made subsequent to approval by the Commission on Constitutional Matters may go into effect only after approval by the Commission on Constitutional Matters of the Synod.
